Partners in Preservation: The Walter P. Reuther Library, Gale Group Inc., and the United Farm Workers Collection

Abstract: In 2008 Gale Group Incorporated approached the Walter P. Reuther Library of Labor and Urban Affairs with a collaborative project to microfilm the United Farm Workers' archival collections. Gale requested permission to microfilm three collections: National Farm Workers Association (NFWA), Agricultural Workers Organizing Committee (AWOC), and the United Farm Workers: Papers of the Office of the President. These three collections provide the most comprehensive history of migrant farm workers' organizing efforts in the United States. Under the contract designed by Gale Group, the collections would be prepared for scanning by archivists at the Reuther Library. An outside agency, paid by Gale Group, would then microfilm the collections. Finally, Gale Group employees would bring together the microfilm, the Reuther finding aids, and a spreadsheet into a prepackaged microfilm product designed to sell to libraries and educational institutions. At the completion of the project the Reuther Library will receive a complete set of the microfilm and may utilize up to 65% of the microfilmed content on the repository's website. The United Farm Workers, the record donors of these collections, will also receive a portion of each sale of the microfilm collection. This is a wonderful example of archives, corporations, and donors coming together to help preserve history and provide greater access to archival collections.
