

# Portraits in the Alice Roosevelt Longworth Collection and the Imperial Household Archives' documents ~Benefit of the new public records management law in Japan~





In July(82member- mission) Alice's high popularity: Teddy's daughter Fashion leader "Princess Alice" free-spirited tomboy On the way to Kyoto, at each station, the mission was warmly welcomed. Taft-Katsura Agreement was dated on July 29.








The Crown Princess acted for the Empress at the reception.

**Episodes on Portraits** 

•Emperor's portrait was handed to the Ambassador in exchange for the President's photo.

•Oct 11 : the Empress and the Crown Princess gave Alice their portraits. Attendant Nagasaki brought both photos with him to Yokohama. The Crown princess, who is the same age with Alice, was taken this photo at the first time.

•The frames of photos were ordered specially, which are made of maple wood. Emperor's photo was already had his signature, then, it was cut to justify the size.
